

## Other Noted MPC Programs

### Maurine Church Coburn School of Nursing

In 1982-83 a nursing school was established at MPC with a grant from the Maurine Church Coburn Charitable Trust. The Nursing School is operated in part with funds from the Community Hospital Foundation.

### Monterey Peninsula College Education Center

MPC's Education Center at Marina gives north county residents an opportunity to pursue a college education close to home or work. Classes are offered in English as a Second Language, basic skills, general education and business. The college plans to expand the list of opportunities offered at the MPC Education Center to meet the educational needs of the Marina, Fort Ord and Seaside communities.

### Police Academy

The MPC Police Academy, partnering with the South Bay Regional Public Safety Training Consortium, provides training for police academy recruits and in-service programs for law enforcement professionals on the Central Coast. The Police Academy is housed at the MPC Regional Public Training Center, 115 Colonel Durham Road, Seaside, next to the Monterey College of Law.

### MPC California Fire Academy & Fire Technology

The Fire Academy offers courses ranging from the Basic Fire Academy program to advanced courses for Fire Officer and Chief Officer level training. Specialty courses in fire prevention, arson investigation and EMT instructor training are also offered. Courses are certified through the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection. A state certificate is offered. The Fire Academy program is housed at the MPC Regional Public Training Center, 115 Colonel Durham Road, Seaside.
