<p>Discussion Agenda</p>	<p>Paul wanted to discuss some questions he had received from faculty and division chairs. What does Active, Inactive, and Archive mean? Another question is what kind of things can be done to meet catalog deadlines? What is a change of substance vs nonsubstance? Gamble thinks Michael would be able to explain best, but her understanding is that SLOs or second discipline changes are non-substantial. Kim can submit a course to the state for approval and a non-substantial change can be approved that same day. Substantial changes are usually unit changes and can take about 1 month to approve. Ideally, everything should be in by December for to make it into the Fall schedules.</p> <p>Kim says the state uses Active, Inactive, and Approved for the courses. Usually a after a course is approved it will become active after a day. If a course is off of our schedule, it becomes inactive at the state. Curricunet uses Active and Pending. If a course is Approved, it will become Active when the course is scheduled to start to be taught. How long does it take to re-activate a course? There is no time-line. Curricunet uses "Historical" for an inactive course and it can easily be re-activated. The state uses Archive for an inactive course, but it also can be easily re-activated. Sometimes when re-activating a course there will be some information missing and the course will need updating. He Seon said that in the past sometimes a course needed for a program was accidentally deleted and needed to be re-activated. Catherine said if you take the historical version and make a course revision that would re-activate the course, although it may be difficult to make the argument to bring a course back,</p>	

	<p>and it would need a justification. Kim thinks we would need an agenda item to discuss bringing a course back.</p> <p>Paul asked about the deadline on the catalog. Is there anything that can be done to affect the catalog? Can a course be deleted and be pulled out of the catalog? Kim thinks it can but we are on the border time-wise, but deletions are easier than additions. Deletions do need approval, and since March 1st is our next CAC meeting, Kim thinks the dean, Kiran or others would need to make the call as to whether we should delete a course. We also would need a course deletion in Curricunet to do so.</p> <p>Rachel noted that there were courses in PSYC and SOCI that are approved, but the Program is not, so she is not sure if it would be ready for Fall. He Seon mentioned that a new course would need state approval and is more complicated to get into the schedule. A new course takes the longest to complete, while deletions are shortest.</p> <p>LaRon asked if we send out an email with the deadlines? Gamble wasn't charged with this. Beth said there was a deadline sent out and courses were submitted on time but not processed. Even if the course met the October deadline, it isn't a given that it will be in the Fall schedule, Kim said. The deadlines are on the website.</p> <p>Gamble mentioned it has been difficult to get courses through due to accreditation issues, people being out, etc... Gamble said that once March 1st deadline passes, she will send an email to tell people to start working on curriculum now for the next year.</p> <p>He Seon showed the group the new GEO area in Curricunet with the new screens and checkboxes. Originators should go into this screen when entering course information. This is open to any originator to change.</p>	
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<p>ETNC 13: (New)</p> <p>For Fall 2017</p>	<p>Introduction to Race and Ethnicity</p> <p>This course is cross-listed with SOCI 13. It has been in the pipeline for over a year. Approval should have included VPAA, but the course was created before we had VPAA approval level in Curricunet. <p>MUSI 10A: (Revision)</p> <p>For Fall 2017</p>	<p>Music Theory and Musicianship I</p> <p>The only revision to the MUSI courses was to adjust the hours and units. Michael asked for this change. Since this was a non-substantial change, but because the courses are old, other changes needed to be made. For example the SLOs weren't right or Objectives were not mapped <u>to the Methods of Evaluation</u>. Gamble did this. Gamble thinks that Fred is willing to compromise now to get done even though <u>the SLOs do need to be not all as thoroughly</u> updated. Fred came in as this was being discussed so we asked him again if it is okay for the outcomes to be left as is. Compared to other certificates, the text is contextualized. Should it say something about deaf Americans? Richard thinks this text is from the linguistics text. <p>CSIS (Revision)</p> <p>For Fall 2017</p>	<p>Computer Information Systems: Associate in Science (Transfer Preparation)</p> <p>Gamble discussed how complicated the CSIS program was and there are several issues. It went back and forth in approval process. Several issues were corrected, but He Seon noticed that</p>	<p>Tabled</p>

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	<p>the attached files didn't follow all the requirements for transfer, only a regular Associate Degree. He Seon had attached the template for this program in Curricunet, which was displayed while she explained that this is an MC (Model Curriculum), not a TMC (Transfer Model Curriculum), so it does not have the same requirements or "perks" for students as a TMC (guaranteed admission to a CSU with admission bump points, 60-unit limit for the AS). We must get all the courses approved to put through the program. He Seon thinks we should submit all the courses for <u>C-ID</u> approval. If the courses have CID approval it makes it easier for a student to transfer. He Seon will discuss the issues with the originator. Because this is a program it will have to be submitted to Chancellor's eOffice and to do so it must have Narrative document which is not in this program. Kim hasn't heard back from Tom, but discussed sending the form to get it complete.</p> <p>Gamble thinks we need to Table this until issues are corrected.</p> <p>LaRon noted that there are several courses included that are non-transferable courses. He Seon noted that those also won't be submitted for CID. This is a revision of the original AS.</p> <p>Kim noted that she has an issue with the course names. Many of the names have been changed. For example, CSIS 76 will be CSIS 76A, 172 will be 72A, 198 to 86, etc... Those changes are coming soon, but she haven't seen them yet. This issue occurred because program is old.</p> <p>If the intention is to get this in the catalog we will have to meet again before March 1st. He Seon says the state would have to approve and all documents would have to be complete, which may be difficult to get done in time.</p> <p>Gamble and Kim will email Tom the issues.
