

MLA Citation Style-8th Edition

This handout covers the latest version of MLA Citation Style. For further detail you may consult the *MLA Handbook-8th edition*, located in the MPC Library reference section at call number **REF LB 2369 .G53 2016**.

In the next few pages are examples of some of the more common sources that you cite when writing research papers. These are good examples/guides to help you when doing your citations. There is also more information on some of the specific rules at the end of this handout.

Author Formatting

General Guidelines for the Whole Works Cited Page

1. Center the title **Works Cited**, one inch from the top of the page.
2. Double space between the title and the first entry.
3. Each entry should begin flush with the left margin. If the entry is more than one line, indent the next line or lines one-half inch (or 5 spaces).
4. Make sure each individual citation is double spaced and that the entire works cited page is uniformly double spaced.
5. Alphabetize the list.

Guidelines for the Specifics within Each Citation

1. Capitalize all significant words **except for** grammatical articles (a, an, the), prepositions and conjunctions. **Capitalize** grammatical articles, prepositions and conjunctions when they are the first word of a title or subtitle.
2. Dates should be in MLA format as Day Month Year. All months are abbreviated except for May, June and July, which are spelled out. The abbreviations are:
Jan. Feb. Mar. Apr. Aug. Sept. Oct. Nov. Dec.
Example: 6/30/16 should be 30 June 2016. 10/3/16 should be 3 Oct. 2016
3. When listing authors only the very first author is last name, first name. Any person listed after the first person is first name last name.
4. Italicize ***Book Titles, Periodical Titles and Database Names***

5. For journal article citations you include the volume and/or issue number. Put **vol.** before the volume number and **no.** before the issue number.
6. When including page numbers, put **pp.** before the page numbers listed. If you are listing just a single page number then just put a single **p.** before it.

Guidelines for Websites and Databases

1. When citing a website include the URL/Web address of the webpage but **do not include** ‘**http://**’ or ‘**https://**’ in the address.
2. When citing a **website** look for a date of creation. If you do not see one then look for a copyright date at the bottom of the page and use that. If there is no date then do not include one and continue to the next part of component of your citation.
3. When citing a journal article from a database or a website, if a DOI number is included (a digital object identifier) then put the DOI at the end of your citation.
4. MLA recommends inclusion of URLs/web addresses in your works cited list but if your instructor prefers that you do not include them, then follow their directions (page 48 in the MLA Handbook-8th edition). For this handout we have **not included** permanent link URLs for articles/eBooks from library databases in our examples but we do include the URL/web address for websites.

MLA Guidelines

The latest edition of MLA Style is not centered on publication formats like the old edition. Instead, a universal set of common sense guidelines common to most works makes it **easier to document new mediums and sources without waiting for new instructions from the MLA**. There are still rules to follow with things like capitalization, italicizing and date formats but this new edition is much more flexible than the last one.

These new guidelines state that the major elements below should be included in the citation. If an element is missing, skip it and continue through the list. They are:

1. Author.
2. Title of Source.
3. Title of Container,
4. Other Contributors,
5. Version,
6. Number,
7. Publisher,
8. Publication Date,
9. Location.

Sometimes elements 3-9 will repeat again. For example, if your article came from a library database, then the additional information would be needed.
